Director's Notes

A Woman of No Importance

by Mr. Oscar Wilde

"A Woman of No Importance" was first presented as "A new and original play of modern life" at the Theatre Royal, Haymarket on the 19th April 1893.

For me, it is a melodrama, a moral tale of retribution and forgiveness revolving around the lines spoken by Lord Illingworth, "Children begin by loving their parents, after a time they judge them. Rarely, if ever, do they forgive them". This is surely a dilemma in which many parents find themselves today.

Lord Illingworth and the other three protagonists, Mrs Arbuthnot, Gerald and Hester, experience events which will change their lives forever. Gerald is the catalyst in these changes, even though he is the only truly innocent and unflawed character in the piece. For the rest of the play, it is peopled by personalities developed from the rules and hypocrisies of the social sphere in which they exist. Their flaws, many unrealised and unintended, and the social codes which created them are under constant attack from the author, Wilde's brilliance and sparkling humour shimmer throughout, creating for his audience an evening which we hope will be moving, witty and highly entertaining.

The "Carriageworks" is probably the most spectacular "gift" to any amateur organisation. It is very likely unique in this country, maybe in the world. A new theatre like this demands new approaches, fresh ideas and an adventurous spirit. Nostalgia can be treated with affection, but a new venture like the "Carriageworks" insists upon optimism.
