



LEEDS ARTS CENTRE was formed in 1945 as an amateur society to encourage and foster interest in the arts. Originally it comprised Drama (including Children's Theatre), Fine Arts, Musical, Literary and Film sections and was based in the Civic Theatre (now Leeds City Museum). Leeds Arts Centre moved to its new home at the Carriageworks in 2005. We are a friendly society, working together to maintain the high standard of its productions. We now present four plays every season, usually in February, March/April, May/June and October, at the Carriageworks Theatre under the umbrella of Leeds Community Arts Network.

'Green Room' events give members the opportunity to perform short plays, extracts and rehearsed readings for a members only audience. They give newer members experience of acting, directing, backstage work and also offer the chance to perform new writing or more experimental work.

The society also hosts regular play readings and social events.

New members are always welcome, and you don't need any experience to join. As well as acting, you could become involved with directing, production management, stage management, set and costume design or construction, co-ordinating properties or costumes, prompting, sound recording and operation, front of house management and publicity. Donna Lucia d'Alvadorez - Margaret Savage




Cast Biographies

The Plot

This classic farce opens with Oxford students Jack and Charley planning to declare their love to their sweethearts, Kitty and Amy, before the girls' mean guardian whisks them off to the country out of reach. The students had intended to ask Charley's long lost aunt, Donna Lucia d'Alvadorez, to act as chaperone. When her visit from Brazil is delayed, their only recourse is to persuade their chum, Lord Fancourt Babberley, to impersonate her.

But when the girls' guardian (Stephen Spettigue) and Jack's father (Sir Francis Chesney) catch the scent of 'Donna Lucia's' millions, they become rivals in love. And when the real Donna Lucia turns up, together with her adopted niece Ela, the web of lies gets even stickier.

Act 1: Interior of Jack Chesney's rooms, St. Olde's College, Oxford. Morning.

Act 2: Exterior of Jack Chesney's rooms. Afternoon.

Act 3: Drawing Room, Spettigue's house. Evening.

The play is in 3 acts with an interval of 15 minutes between Acts 1 & 2

The Flint Street Nativity by Tim Firth

Mizzis Horrocks' class of seven year olds is about to perform their nativity play at Flint Street Junior School for the proud mums and dads - and the occasional social worker. Squabbles arise when Gabriel wants to play Mary, the Star grumbles he's not a proper star like they have at NASA, Herod won't stop waving to his mum and dad and the subversive Innkeeper is determined to liven up the traditional script. And then the class pet escapes...

Hamlet by William Shakespeare

Directed by Ken Taylor February 2019

Prince Hamlet's father, the King of Denmark, is dead. Hamlet is prevented from succeeding to the throne by his mother, Queen Gertrude, too quickly marrying his father's brother, Claudius, who becomes king in his place. Not only is Hamlet prevented from becoming King, but his Uncle Claudius is now his stepfather. When the old king appears as a ghost, he tells Hamlet that he was, in fact, murdered by his brother, Claudius. Hamlet is entreated by his father's ghost to take revenge. Hamlet sets about a scheme to take revenge by appearing to become mad, and alienating all who love him. It sometimes seems that he has truly lost his sanity. Claudius himself, fearing discovery of his fratricide, lays out plans to do away with Hamlet. The scene is set. Tragedy looms.
