Shirley Valentine

"I like a glass of wine when I cook, don't I, wall?" says Shirley Valentine.

It's one of the most famous opening lines in recent theatre history, as Willy

Russell's wistful, downtrodden, but finally triumphant housewife-heroine confides her tale to the audience.

This delightful play is a warm-hearted look at a 42 year old woman's escape to her always-young inner self. Shirley Valentine longs to escape the dull routine of her lacklustre home, and her domineering (yet morose) husband whose sharp edges and coarse habits keep her locked in boredom.

Moving about her kitchen, chopping potatoes and folding towels as she prepares eggs and chips which have to "be on the table when (hubby) Joe walks through that door," Shirley gradually evokes her son and two daughters who are grown up, leaving her in the clutches of an empty marriage.

"Marriage is like the Middle East," she says thoughtfully.
"There's no solution." In this demanding one-woman show she describes her friend Jane, who "became a feminist" when her husband ran off with the milkman.

As she sips a glass of wine she dreams of drinking in the country where the grape is grown. When Jane offers a holiday in Greece, Shirley seizes the opportunity and rediscovers her younger self.

The play is a combination of poignant realizations, broadly written comic recollections, and thoroughly recognizable details of the humdrum side of life.

Shirley, breaking out of the mould cast for her by society, is brilliantly shown with humour, warm sympathy and human insight.

WILLY RUSSELL

Willy Russell was born in Whiston, near Liverpool, in 1947. At 15 he left school to work as a hairdresser until 20. He then decided to return to school and finish his education starting work on his first play — the *Blind Scouse* trilogy which went to the Edinburgh Festival. A representative of the Everyman Theatre was impressed and subsequently produced world premieres of many of Russell's plays.

Russell has enjoyed West End success with When The Reds, Sam O'Shanker, John Paul George Ringo... and Bert, Breezeblock Park, Stags And Hens, One For The Road, and Blood Brothers.

Commissioned by the RSC, Russell's famous *Educating Rita* proved so successful that it too was produced in the West End. It won the 1980 Society of West End Theatres Award for Best Comedy, and was later made into an Oscar nominated film, for which Russell wrote the screenplay, starring Michael Caine and Julie Walters.

Shirley Valentine had a lengthy run both in the West End and on Broadway, where Pauline Collins won critical acclaim (and both the SWET & TONY Awards as Best Actress). It too made a successful transfer to film in 1989, again starring Pauline Collins along with Tom Conti as Costas.
