The Play

This bawdy comedy, written in 1675, was controversial even in its own time for its sexual explicitness, and was considered too outrageous to be performed at all between 1753 and 1924. Since then it has been regularly revived, and is now considered to be one of the wittiest and best of the Restoration comedies.

The Plot

The notorious rake, Horner, spreads a rumour around London that he has been made impotent so that husbands will trust him alone with their wives, thus affording him the opportunity to seduce them. Meanwhile, the insanely jealous Pinchwife marries an innocent country wife, Margery, in the hope that she will not have the wit to deceive him, but her curiosity about town life soon leads her to the lascivious Horner. Contrasting with these two stories of deception, Pinchwife's virtuous sister, Alithea, falls in love with Horner's friend, Harcourt, but is determined to remain true to her previous engagement to the foolishly complacent Sparkish, until a misunderstanding reveals his true nature.

The Author

William Wycherley was born in 1640, the eldest son of a wealthy Shropshire family and was educated in France, at Oxford and in fashionable Restoration London where he became a friend of the Duke of Buckingham and a favourite of King Charles II. His first play, *Love in a Wood*, appeared in 1671, and was a great success. Shortly afterwards he began an affair with Lady Castlemaine, one of the king's mistresses.

"As King Charles was extremely fond of him upon account of his wit, some of the Royal Mistresses set no less value upon Those Parts in him, of which they were more proper judges."

Wycherley wrote three more plays: The Gentleman Dancing Master (1672), The Country Wife (1675) and The Plain Dealer (1676). In 1679 he was employed by the king as tutor to his illegitimate son, the Earl of Richmond, but a poorly concealed secret marriage in 1680 caused Charles to withdraw his favour, and when the lady died a year later, Wycherley was imprisoned for debt.

"As the catastrophe of all comedies is marriage, marriage was likewise the catastrophe of poor Wycherley's own comick scenes; for he married, and the rest of his life was a deep tragedy."

He was released from prison in 1685, when King James II was impressed by a performance of *The Plain Dealer*, and retired to Shropshire until 1700, when he inherited his family estate and returned to London. In 1716, at the age of seventy-six, he married again to deprive a nephew of his inheritance, and eleven days later he died. He is buried in St. Paul's, Covent Garden.
