The Phantom of the Opera

In the darkest depths beneath the Paris Opera House lurks the mysterious, masked Phantom. His desperate desire for love fuels his obsession with the beautiful young singer, Christine. Driven to blackmail, kidnap and murder, the Phantom holds the entire Opera house in his spell of dark fascination.

This new dramatisation, a premiere for Leeds Arts Centre, remains more faithful to Gaston Leroux's original novel than the majority of adaptations since the famous 1924 film starring Lon Chaney.

Leroux, a painstaking researcher, interspersed the fictional elements of The Phantom of the Opera with real characters, events and places. . .

The Paris Opera House opened in 1875 after a construction period fraught with problems. Work began on the site in 1861, revealing an underground stream. A lake was created deep beneath the stage area and its water powered the hydraulic stage machinery.

Building was halted in 1870 with the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian war. The unfinished building was used as an observation post, communications centre, powder store and military prison. Perhaps it was in this period that the idea that the Opera was haunted by tormented spirits took hold.

The gala opening of the Opera on 5th January, 1875 signalled the renaissance of Paris and heralded the beginning of *La Belle Époque* - a period of elegance; excitement and high living.

The Opera House covers a site of nearly three acres. It is seventeen storeys high, seven of which are below ground level. Suspended in the centre of its auditorium is an ornate chandelier - seven tons of metal-work and glass. In 1896, a steel hawser holding one of its counterweights burned through in an electrical fire. The weight broke, smashed through the ceiling and a woman was crushed to death by debris.

Leroux's narrative is in the journalistic style and due to the blurring of fact and fiction, appears almost documentary. He begins:

The Opera Ghost really existed. He was not, as was long believed, a creature of the imagination . . .

GASTON LEROUX

Gaston Leroux was born in Paris in 1868. A star pupil at school, he frequently won prizes for his academic ability and in 1889, he gained a degree in law. In the same year, his father died, leaving him a million francs - which he rapidly squandered on drink, gambling and ill-considered speculations. Unhappy with the legal profession, he successfully applied for a journalistic post with *L'Echo de Paris*.

Soon after, *Le Matin* offered him a more prestigious and lucrative position as a roving correspondent. Leroux travelled far and wide, across Europe, Russia, Asia and Africa. He frequently adopted disguises to get a good story and witnessed some of the greatest historical events of the period. In 1907, however, he gave up his journalistic travels to become a full time novelist.

Nora commits forgery, to secure a loan fraudulently and is proud of her actions, because she has done it out of love, to save the life of her husband. When the secret is revealed, he reacts with horror, taking the conventional 'honourable' standpoint, to the letter of the law.
