ALAN AYCKBOURN is probably Britain's most prolific and successful playwright. Born in London in 1939, he was educated at Haileybury and has worked in the theatre in some capacity ever since he left school. After spells in repertory at Edinburgh, Worthing, Leatherhead and Oxford, he joined Stephen Joseph's studio theatre at Scarborough. He produced radio drama for the BBC in Leeds between 1964 and 1970 but returned to Scarborough to become director of productions at the Library Theatre, which later became the Stephen Joseph Theatre-in-the-Round.

He has written numerous plays, almost all of which have been premiered at Scarborough. The vast majority have transferred to London and many have been televised; most of them are regularly performed by amateur and professional companies all over the country. *Time and Time Again* is the sixth 'Ayckbourn' to be presented by Leeds Arts Centre, previous productions being *Relatively Speaking*, *Ten Times Table*, *Living Together*, *Round and Round The Garden* and *How The Other Half Loves*.

He on once claimed that he thought about a play for fifty-one weeks and then wrote it in six days. Long may he continue to delight audiences with this highly successful formula.

The Drama Group mounts five productions - usually including a musical or review type show - at the Civic Theatre.



Interval Drinks

Avoid the interval rush by placing your drinks order at the bar before the performance commences.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- (a) The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors, and such doors must at that time be open.
- (b) All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction.
- (c) Persons shall not be permitted to stand or sit in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- (d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance so as to ensure it being in proper working order.

The Leeds Civic Theatre shares the Institute Building with the Leeds College of Music. This may mean that occasionally performances may be subjected to slight acoustic problems. Whilst both parties do everything within their power to keep this to a minimum, we cannot prevent it completely. We apologise, therefore, for any inconvenience which may be caused.
