# WHAT THE BUTLER SAW



## LEEDS CIVIC THEATRE

Thursday, 6th to Saturday, 8th February, 2003 at 7.30 p.m.

At first glance, What The Butler Saw may appear to be a conventional sex farce. From the beginning it has all the right ingredients - a doctor trying to seduce a secretary, his wife returning unexpectedly and the doctor frantically trying to explain away the presence in his consulting room of a naked woman. But although the play borrows the clothes of the popular farce, it is anything but conventional.

Joe Orton, a gay man who lived most of his life during a time when homosexuality was illegal and treated as a psychiatric disorder, would have felt the pressure of the conventional sexual morality which is one of his targets in *What The Butler Saw.* He was often frustrated by the lack of sexual freedom he could enjoy in England, where he resorted to using toilets to pick up sexual partners, and had to travel to Morocco to find what he was looking for.


It was perhaps the fact that, as he once wrote, 'Every sacred cow pastures in England', which was behind much of the questioning of conventional sexual morality in *What The Butler Saw.* Whereas most other plays in the genre took as their starting point the idea that anything other than heterosexuality is abnormal and to be made fun of, Orton's materpiece casually shows bisexuality as the norm, showing that definitions of sexuality are often strait-jackets into which real people struggle to fit.

This challenge to society's traditional attitudes was probably the reason *What The Butler Saw* received such a savage response from the audience on its opening night in 1969. The audience members who shouted 'filth' were the same kind of people whose homophobia hastened Oscar Wilde's death in the previous century. It may have been seventy years later, but the sexual intolerance was the same.

Jumping forward to the present day, What The Butler Saw had been recognised as a classic and is regularly performed. Attitudes towards sexuality have also become somewhat more enlightened. Still, as it was only a few years ago that the Sun newspaper whipped up homophobia by asking if Britain was being run by a 'gay mafia', we still have a long way to go until a person's sexual practices cease to be a matter of judgement by others.
