

Arsenic and Old Lace

Joseph Kesselring was born in New York City in 1902. He chose to follow a theatrical career early on in life and before turning to playwriting he taught music, assisted in amateur theatre productions, acted and directed.

Arsenic and Old Lace is Kesselring's best known play and a classic black farce. It was written in 1944 and was made into a highly successful film starring Cary Grant and Peter Lorre with Josephine Hull and Jean Adair as the Brooklyn ladies.

To assist those younger members and remind those older members of our audience some inside information might help:-

- ❖ Theodore (Teddy) Roosevelt (1858 1919) became popular in the United States due to his exploits in the Spanish-American war. He became Republican Vice President in 1900 and President when McKinley was assassinated (1901). He was re-elected in 1905 to be followed by Taft 1909-1913 and then Woodrow-Wilson 1913-1921.
- ❖ Burns Mantle was a distinguished American theatre critic.
- Judith Anderson played Mrs Danvers in the film "Rebecca"

Arsenic and old Lace was presented by Leeds Arts Centre in 1976 – 25 years ago!

Mr Tony Nelson (our Director) played the part of Mortimer Brewster in 1951 – 50 years ago!!

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

(a) The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors and such doors must at all times be open

(b) All gangways passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction.

Persons shall not be permitted to stand in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any other unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Sub-Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.

(d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of

each performance to show that it is in proper working order.

The entire action of the play takes place in the living room of the Brewster home in Brooklyn.
