NOEL COWARD was born at Teddington on 16th December 1899. His talents for singing, dancing and acting were quickly recognized and he made his first professional appearance at the age of eleven, being reviewed as "a promising young talent in a star cast of wonder children" (including Michael MacLiammoir and Ninette de Valois).

He began writing and composing whilst still in his teens, starring in his own play in the West End for the first time in 1919.

By the age of twenty-four he had succeeded in establishing himself as an actor, playwright, director, lyricist, composer and comedian. He became the darling of society, adored equally for the wit of his lyrics and dialogue, the sparkle of his music and the polish of his performance. The next ten years saw a run of glittering successes, both dramatic and musical, including *Bitter Sweet, Private Lives, Cavalcade, Hay Fever* and the revue *Words and Music*, which introduced, among other songs, *Mad Dogs and Englishmen*.

After the war he continued to act (on stage and in films), compose and write (plays, lyrics and stories) until the 1960s, by which time his earlier plays were beginning to be revived.

He was knighted in 1970 for services to the theatre just after his seventieth birthday. Terence Rattigan described him as "simply a phenomenon and one that is unlikely to occur ever again in theatre history". He died in March 1973 and was buried at Firefly Hill, his home in Jamaica, but his "talent to amuse" continues to delight audiences the world over.

BLITHE SPIRIT was written in only five days. In 1941 Noel Coward decided he must make some "lasting contribution" to the war effort and that this contribution should be one really good song (London Pride), one really patriotic film (In Which We Serve) and one really good play "to make the nation laugh". Amazingly he managed all three in four months, writing Blithe Spirit between 4th and 9th May. The original production starred Fay Compton, Cecil Parker, Kay Hammond and Margaret Rutherford and ran for four years.

In 1955 he cut its running time to an hour and a half for an American television production and in 1964 produced a musical version, *High Spirits*, which ran successfully on Broadway for over a year, although its success was not repeated in London.

An all-girl cast once played Blithe Spirit in Tokyo; had he known, Coward said, he would have flown to Tokyo 'just to see Dr. Bradman played by a geisha'.

Blithe Spirit shows Noel Coward at his brilliant best; no doubt it will continue to 'make the nation laugh' as often as it is performed.

Interval Drinks

Avoid the interval rush by placing your drinks order at the bar before the performance commences.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- (a) The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exit and entrance doors, and such doors must at that time be open.
- (b) All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction.
- (c) Persons shall not be permitted to stand or sit in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space as been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- (d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance so as to ensure it being in proper working order.

The Leeds Civic Theatre shares the Institute Buildings with the Leeds College of Music. This may mean that occasionally performances may be subject to slight acoustic problems. Whilst both parties do everything within their power to keep this to a minimum, we cannot prevent it completely. We apologise, therefore, for any inconvenience which may be caused.
