

ABOUT THE PLAY

"Cromwell" is an outstanding example of David Storey's gift. Set in the Civil War, parts of it are in verse, both blank verse and rhyme, which Storey wields to achieve an incomparable effect of period. It is a poetic evocation of the futility of war, which washes backwards and forwards over the lives of ordinary people who are struggling to make something constructive of their day to day existence, but who find resolution only in death.

H. N. Brailsford, writing of the Civil War, in "The Levellers and the English Revolution," states—"To understand this period, the most exciting chapter in our national history, we have to realise that the mass, the great majority of the English population, were political illiterates who had endured the Civil War as neutrals, understanding nothing of the issues The volunteers who fought gladly, were on either side a minority: from 1643 onwards both King and Parliament had to fill their ranks with pressed men, snatched from civilian life, often with harsh violence. At a later stage, in regions of the south and west, the farmers and peasants organised themselves as 'Clubmen,' whose purpose was to keep both sides at bay. Hobbes insisted on the indifference of the masses. There were very few of the common people that cared much for either of the causes, but would have taken any side for pay or plunder."

Sir Arthur Hasling, the republican leader, said the same thing about the majority in less offensive language: "They care not what government they live under, so as they plough and go to market."

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

The son of a miner, David Storey was born in Yorkshire in 1933, and studied at the Slade School of Art.

His first highly successful novel, "This Sporting Life," was published in 1960, and awarded the U.S. Macmillan Fiction Award. As a novelist turned playwright, he has quickly established himself as one of the most important writers in the theatre today. In 1971, David Storey won the first Writer of the Year Award, given by the Variety Club of Great Britain.

David Storey has been described by the "Guardian" as 'a writer who genuinely extends the territory of drama."

The "Listener" writes of him—'David Storey's plays become ever more refined, as austere as Pinter or even Beckett, but nearer to common experience, almost naturalistic.'
