The Hlan

The character of Dracula is based on a real person: Vlad Tepes, a fifteenth—century ruler of the Transylvanian province of Wallachia. The Romanian people still regard him as an heroic figure, the defender of Thristendom against the Turkish invasion of Turope. His father had been known as 'Dracul' or 'The Dragon', because he was a member of the Order of the Dragon, pledged to fighting the Turks. Vlad Tepes inherited the name 'Dracula' meaning 'Zon of the Dragon'. 'Dracul' also came to mean 'The Devil', because Vlad was a savage, bloodthirsty, psychopathic sadist, known as 'The Impaler' from having impaled thousands of his enemies on stakes. His cruelties also included dismembering, blinding, strangling, skinning and castrating his victims, as well as boiling them alive and exposing them to the elements or wild animals. Tarly Terman woodcuts show him dining among his victims, whose blood he was said to drink.

The Myth

In Bram Stoker's novel, Dracula has survived for four hundred years as a vampire, capable of changing himself into a wolf or but or even a mist, and sucking the blood from living people. Stoker published his novel in 1897, since which time "Dracula" has developed into a world—wide cult inspiring books, films, plays, television programmes, comics, newspaper articles, academic research, societies, endless merchandising campaigns and spoofs.

The Play

Tiz Tochhead's version of "Dracula" rejects the spoofs with which the story has so often been associated in late years, and restores the tragedy of Bram Stoker's original in a powerful, poetic and intensely dramatic retelling of the tale. The outpourings of the madman, Renfield, reveal the unacceptable truth we all try to ignore: there is something of Dracula in all of us, and he becomes a metaphor for a choice we all must make.

The Drama Group mounts five productions - usually including a musical or review type show - at the Civic Theatre.



Interval Drinks

Avoid the interval rush by placing your drinks order at the bar before the performance commences.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- (a) The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors, and such doors must at that time be open.
- (b) All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction.
- (c) Persons shall not be permitted to stand or sit in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- (d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance so as to ensure it being in proper working order.

The Leeds Civic Theatre shares the Institute Building with the Leeds College of Music. This may mean that occasionally performances may be subjected to slight acoustic problems. Whilst both parties do everything within their power to keep this to a minimum, we cannot prevent it completely. We apologise, therefore, for any inconvenience which may be caused.
