


Mia is young, free and single and hasn't had sex for the last eleven and a half months, only to wake one morning up pregnant! To make matters worse the Angel Gabriel is on your doorstep claiming parentage! This is the situation that Immaculate's young heroine finds herself, which is a surprising turn of events to say the least, as she isn't exactly 'the Virgin Mary'.

'Immaculate' is a black comedy of misconceived conceptions that deals with religion, relationships and responsibilities. It explores the reality of immaculate conception and how it would be received by a generation of non-believers.

Oliver Lansley's *Immaculate* was first performed at the 2005 Edinburgh Festival, and is a light-hearted play, filled with dark comedy, farcical confusion, and a fine array of characters all lined up to answer the big question - who is the father of Mia's baby?






