Nick Dear's modern English version of *Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme* received its British première at the National Theatre in 1992. Timothy Spall took the title role as Monsieur Jourdain, with Anita

Dobson taking the stage as Madame Jourdain.

The play concerns the mishaps of social-climber Monsieur Jourdain, as he tries to make himself a gentleman, marry daughter, Lucile to a Marquis and seduce the lovely Dorimène. Determined to thwart his plans are Lucile's true-love Cléonte with his quick-thinking manservant; not to mention Jourdain's exasperated wife, feisty maid Nicole and the raffish Count Dorante (who wants Dorimène for himself!)

Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme was written by Molière in 1670. Louis XIV commissioned his court composer, Lully, to write a musical entertainment. At the eleventh hour, Molière received a request to provide some amusing scenes to accompany it.

Originally, the music and dancing would have had the same status as the action of the play. The whole entertainment would have ended with a spectacular scene not unlike the grand song and dance scenes beloved of the early Hollywood musicals.

Dear's version vigorously updates previous English translations. The language is earthy, even coarse. Molière's plot, rather reminiscent of a *Carry On* film, or perhaps *Blackadder*, suits the style of ribald English farce which Dear employs.

The action of the play takes place within, and on the street before Monsieur Jourdain's house.

The year is 1670.

Monsieur Jourdain, the 'hero' of the play has always been rather a figure of fun in English theatre. As his wife notes, he is a fool, and the world '(has) been laughing at you for a very long time.'

It's true that Monsieur Jourdain is loud, bossy and not very bright — but to his credit, he knows his limitations. He is desperate to learn, to improve himself. For all his faults, Jourdain is essentially a likeable character.

It says a lot of Molière's original story and Dear's skill as a translator that the play remains, after three centuries, a tremendously funny social comedy.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors and such doors must at all times be open
- b All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept enitrely free from chairs or any other obstructions.
- c Persons shall not be permitted to stand in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any other unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such place has been specially allowed by the Licensing Commitee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- d The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance to show that it is in proper working order.
