


The action takes place entirely in the parlour of the March family home between Christmas, 1861 and Christmas, 1862.


### Fiona Galloway - Jo


#### Maria Kwater - Marmee





#### Michael Crowe – Laurie




## Richard Koslowsky – Mr Brooke

Originally from Leeds, this is Richard's first production with LAC. He trained at London's Royal Central School of Speech and Drama and has worked in both TV/Film and Theatre. After moving back to Leeds, and being impressed with the material LAC produce, Richard joined last year and is looking forward to playing John Brooke in *Little Women*.



#### **Howard Russell – Mr Laurence**

Howard is in his third year of acting with LAC. Previous roles have included a Catholic priest, a 7 year-old schoolboy, a retired colonel home from India, and the Lord Chamberlain to the King of Denmark. 'Variety is the spice' being one of his favourite maxims, he now moves on to play an orphan's grandfather in New England during the American Civil War.



## Ken Taylor – Mr March

Zoë's directorial debut for LAC was NF Simpson's *A Resounding Tinkle*, followed by *The Price* by Arthur Miller, *Top Girls* by Caryl Churchill and *Steel Magnolias* by Robert Harling. Zoë would like to dedicate this production to her 'Marmee', her sister and her soul sisters.



## **Thoughts from the Director**

I was first introduced to the novel of Little Women at the age of ten, by my Mum, whose favourite book this is. I have read it so many times since, that when I came to re-read the book prior to starting rehearsals, I found that my copy was falling apart! It is hard to explain why I love it so much - maybe it's the strong female characters, or the exploration of how women cope without the 'man of the house', or that the sisters are so rounded and well written that I can relate to them all. Whatever the reason, I find something new each time I read it.

As I love the book so much and enjoy directing plays with interesting female characters, I wondered if there was a stage adaptation and discovered many. I chose the Peter Clapham adaptation for a number of reasons - it recounts the story of only the first book in the *Little Women* series and has a nice symmetry, both beginning and ending at Christmas. It is also easy to stage, with all the action taking place in the March family home, so no need to re-create a frozen lake, theatre or ballroom!

Some people who have read the book or seen other adaptations may be disappointed that their favourite scene isn't included in this version, and for this I apologise! As this play covers just the first book, no-one gets married, and no-one dies — that all takes place in 'Good Wives' which I encourage you to read. If you're especially hooked, you could follow this up with Jo's Boys and Little Men too!

#### The Plot

The play is set in New England, Civil War America, between the Christmases of 1861 and 1862.

The four March sisters and their 'Marmee', together with their long-suffering, faithful maid Hannah, learn to cope with life, love, near-death illness and sibling rivalries whist their Father is away working as a minister with the troops.




## **About the Author - Louisa May Alcott**

Louisa May Alcott was born in 1832. Her father was the Transcendentalist teacher Bronson Alcott, whose friends included Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry David Thoreau. Louisa published her first stories aged 19 and the income from these helped support her family. Little Women, published in 1869 was a great success on its first publication. Louisa worked as a teacher and a nurse and was a vigorous campaigner for women's rights. She died in 1888.




#### **Historical context**

The American Civil War (1861 to 1865), fought between the northern and southern United States, began primarily over the long-standing controversy over the enslavement of black people. The Confederate states in the south wished to uphold slavery, the northern states wanted to abolish it.

The war ended when General Robert E. Lee surrendered to General Ulysses S. Grant at the Battle of Appomattox Court House. Much of the South's infrastructure was destroyed, especially transportation systems. The Confederacy collapsed and slavery was abolished. Four million black slaves were freed, with Constitutional amendments and federal legislation granting civil and political rights to freed slaves.


#### The Father by Florian Zeller
