

EVERYONE HAS HEARD OF AGATHA CHRISTIE. Born in Torquay in 1890 of an American father and an English mother, her quiet, normal middle class home and lifestyle offered no element of the mystery or mayhem which made her the most famous detective novelist of her generation.

Her first story, *The Mysterious Affair At Styles*, written in 1920, created the Belgian private detective Hercule Poirot, noted for his moustaches and his 'little grey cells'. Poirot's career extended through innumerable stories until *Curtain* in 1975, but in the meantime his author had produced the equally famous and rather more endearing Miss Jane Marple, who made her first appearance in *Murder At The Vicarage*. Her other detective creations - Superintendent Battle and Tommy and Tuppence Beresford - were less successful, but Poirot and Miss Marple have stood the test of time and are still widely read and much loved today.

Originally written in 1930, Murder At The Vicarage was later successfully adapted for the stage, along with Witness For The Prosecution, The Spider's Web and the all time record-breaking The Mousetrap. A great many 'Agatha Christies' have been translated to the large and small screens; Murder On The Orient Express and Death On The Nile must rank as two of the best film versions, whilst Miss Marple has recently enjoyed a splendid revival on television.

In many ways, Murder At The Vicarage, epitomises the 'golden age' of detective fiction, with its collection of typical middle class stock characters set in the quiet civilised village of St. Mary Mead. Miss Marple is ladylike, unassuming and only occasionally waspish but her vigilant observation and shrewd common sense run rings round the stolid police officer who reluctantly accepts her assistance.

The Drama Group mounts five productions - usually including a musical or review type show - at the Civic Theatre.



Interval Drinks

Avoid the interval rush by placing your drinks order at the bar before the performance commences.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- (a) The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors, and such doors must at that time be open.
- (b) All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction.
- (c) Persons shall not be permitted to stand or sit in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- (d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance so as to ensure it being in proper working order.

The Leeds Civic Theatre shares the Institute Building with the Leeds College of Music. This may mean that occasionally performances may be subjected to slight acoustic problems. Whilst both parties do everything within their power to keep this to a minimum, we cannot prevent it completely. We apologise, therefore, for any inconvenience which may be caused.
