About the Play and the Playrights

As anyone who knows me will tell you, I tend to be something of a bore when American stage comedies are mentioned and if not threatened with ejection from the Civic Theatre bar, will embark on a lengthy dissertation on this, my particular Hobby Horse.

Quite simply I am of the opinion that during the period 1930 to about 1950 some of the finest English-speaking comedies were written. And when I say English-speaking, I mean of course, American, for in this time were written "Arsenic and Old Lace", "The Man who came to Dinner", "Harvey", "George Washington Slept Here", "You Can't Take it with You" to name but a few and here we have another superb comedy in "My Sister Eileen".

"Eileen" was first produced at the Biltmore Theatre, New York on December 26th, 1940 and in London in 1943 with Coral Browne playing the part of Ruth Sherwood. The film version was first seen in 1942 with Rosalind Russell and Janet Blair playing the lead roles and in 1953 the play was made into a musical called "Wonderful Town".

The writers of "My Sister Eileen", Joseph Fields and Jerome Chodorov, spent many years in Hollywood in the period about which I have such an affection and during this time wrote many film scenarios including "The Doughgirls", "The French Touch" and "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes".

Fields' first venture into script writing was during World War I when he wrote sketches for Navy revues. After the war he continued writing for films such as "The Ziegfeld Follies". Chodorov collaborated with Oscar Hammerstein to write "Flower Drum Song" in 1958.

These then, are the men who wrote "My Sister Eileen", the story of two small town girls who leave home to make a living in New York and find themselves in Greenwich Village, where, in the semi basement slum of a bed-sit, they meet the sort of people who they never knew existed in glorious characters such as Appopolous, Wreck, Violet (the stripper), Jensen and many, many more.

We hope you enjoy the play as much as we have enjoyed rehearsing it. D.S.
