Background to the play

A group of 10 actors first performed *Our Country's Good* at the Royal Court Theatre, in tandem with a production of *The Recruiting Officer*, in 1988. Their constraints were financial - hence the small cast and the extensive doubling of parts in each production. Wertenbaker herself makes a joke of this in her play. The amateur theatre has constraints of course but we don't have to pay our actors, so we can use as many as we like - or as many as we can get! Typically in amateur theatre, there are more women wanting to act than there are parts available. Thus it is that I have not extensively "doubled" the men as in the original production; yet, like the original production, several of the women convicts become officers of the first Australian penal colony.

Timberlake Wertenbaker based her play on Thomas Keneally's novel *The Playmaker*, which is itself based on historical fact. The recruiting officer was performed, as a celebration of the birthday of George III on Thursday 4th June 1789 by the convicts of the Penal Settlement, Sydney Cove. The colony had been established after a horrific 8 month voyage the year before. Most lags had been sentenced to 7 years transportation, including:

Robert Sideway for stealing property worth 28/=. James (Ketch) Freeman highway attack and theft of 12/=. John Wisehammer stealing snuff.

John Arscott burglary of watches and tobacco.

Mary Brenham not yet 14 at sentencing; cloth and

clothes value 39/=.

Duckling Smith (supposed name Ann) sentenced to death,

age 16; 40/= silverware.

Dabby (Mary) Bryant sentenced to be hanged for highway robbery/

assault on a woman of a silk bonnet, 12d and other goods value 11/=. Reprieved.

Nancy Turner (Liz Morden) clothing valued 40/=.

In Australia sentenced to hang for perjury.

The Authorities, too are well documented. Davey Collins, Watkin Tench, as well as Ralph Clark, all kept journals. In his, Ralph writes much of his wishes to be promoted, but especially of his nightmares and of his concerns about his wife, Betsey-Alicia, in England. Late in 1791, when he was sent back to England, he had to leave behind his lag wife, Mary, and their child, Alicia. Dabby fulfilled her wish to return to Devon. After an amazing voyage to the Dutch East Indies in a stolen fishing boat and recapture in Batavia, she was eventually shipped back to Newgate. There the famous journal-writer James Boswell began a drive for her release. He settled £10 a year on her before seeing her aboard a ship on the Thames which took her back to her family in Fowey.

Finally, it is interesting to note that Keneally dedicates his novel to Governor Phillip's "adopted" aboriginal... "Arabanoo and his brethren, still dispossessed."

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

b. All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstructions.

a. The public may leave at the end of the performance by all exits and entrance doors and such doors must at that time be open.

c. Persons shall not be permitted to stand in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any other unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.

d. The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance to show that it is in proper working order.


Costume Hire
