Sisterly Feelings

ALAN AYCKBOURN was born in 1939 and educated at Haileybury. He has worked in the theatre all his life as an actor, stage manager, writer and director, including six years as a BBC Radio Drama producer in Leeds. He is now director of Productions at the Theatre-in-the-Round at Westwood, Scarborough, where he also lives.

He has been writing full length plays for thirty-five years, most of which have been premiered at Scarborough and gone on to take the West End - and the rest of the country - by storm. His plays have received numerous awards, been translated into twenty-five languages and entertained millions all over the world.

sisterly feelings is described by its author not as a farce (although there are moments of pure farce in it) but as 'a related comedy.' 'Related' in the sense that it is about relations (a family) and relationships, but also because it embodies four different but closely related versions of the same play, all of which share the same opening and closing scenes. The plot concerns two sisters, Abigail and Dorcas, and the choices they make, or have made for them, over a period of six months. Those choices, whether random or deliberate, determine the version of the play which you will see tonight.

LEEDS ARTS CENTRE has established a glowing reputation for first rate productions of Alan Ayckbourn's plays. To date these have included Relatively Speaking, Ten Times Table, Taking Steps, How The Other Half Loves, Time and Time Again and all three of The Norman Conquests trilogy. A new production of Relatively Speaking will complete our 1995/6 season.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- c. Persons shall not be permitted to stand in any of the intersecting gangways, or stand in any other unseated space in the auditorium, unless standing in such a space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- d. The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before the commencement of each performance to make sure it is in proper working order.
