

The first version of SWEENEY TODD, written by George Dibdin Pitt was presented in 1842. Pitt was responsible for a large number of plays but SWEENEY TODD is the only one of his works which is still generally remembered. The text at present attributed to him is probably corrupt, having been altered during successive productions. Unlike MARIA MARTEN (which we presented in 1961), THE DEMON BARBER is merely based on legend.

There seems to be a traditional pattern about most available versions of this play. The script we use this evening, however, differs widely. The plot has been altered in several ways — particularly in the relationships of the characters (for example, Todd normally has no amorous designs on Johanna), in the situations (for example, an asylum sequence usually appears) and in the age of the characters (Tobias Rigg and Jarvis Williams are young boys in the original). We hope that any members of the audience who know the traditional version will enjoy our variations.

Our next production at this theatre will be from January 25th to 30th. The play will be Oscar Wilde's AN IDEAL HUSBAND, produced by Stanley Smith. We look forward to seeing you then.
