

A note from our Director

The plays of Harold Pinter, and of Samuel Beckett who influenced him, are great vehicles for directors and actors to demonstrate their skills, (or conversely, their lack of them). The Birthday Party is a prime example of a work that elicits great drama and tension through a mix of the banal and the absurd, but which gives an audience a true and vivid experience of the events being portrayed. I chose a segment of this play for my LAC Green Room (directing skill demonstration), precisely for that reason. One watches a Pinter play in the same way as one would watch an event taking place in real life, not analysing what is said, but appreciating what it does to those hearing it.

This is a play which has demanded, and has received the very best of the assembled talents, both on and off stage, that have come together to present it to you. It has been a very intense and ultimately rewarding process, with some heart in mouth moments, but with that feeling of excitement that comes when the play begins to respond to some very hard work, and it comes to life as a wonderful piece of theatre.

I have been privileged during the production of this play to hear anecdotes personally from people who actually spoke to Harold Pinter about The Birthday Party. One person visiting his studio found that he kept the receipts from the first, failed performance of The Birthday Party framed in his toilet. A director who spent all day with Pinter seeking clarity, was finally told that it was all about cricket, and an actor who asked Pinter why his character acted in a certain way was told to "mind your own business."

With such help from the author, I have had to make my own decisions, and so now will you. I feel that we have done justice to the play, and hope that by the end of the evening you will share my view.





Meg and Petey Boles live in a seaside town in the late 1950's. They have a lodger, Stanley Webber, who is an unemployed piano player.


Meg is very happy to have Stanley living with them. It puts a touch of 'show business' into her life, and plays up to her belief that she is a bona fide Seaside Landlady. Petey takes the view that if Meg is happy, he is happy.

All is going along smoothly until Petey discloses that while attending to his deck chairs he was approached by two men, who asked if they could come and stay.


Meg is delighted. Petey takes it in his stride. Stanley is horrified; with very, very, good reason.

There will be a 20 minute interval between Act 2 and Act 3.



Edward Corbet. Goldberg. Joined LAC in 2001, and has acted in many productions, for LAC and for other companies throughout Leeds during a long acting career. Currently working with the Royal Shakespeare Company on the Dream 16 Project.



James Bell. McCann. Has acted in a number of productions for LAC, and is also a member of Shatterproof Theatre. James was nominated for a Guild Award for Best Supporting Male Actor for The Money's in The Bank



Ken Taylor. *Director.* Ken joined LAC in 2012, having acted and directed for many years in Bradford, mainly at Bradford Playhouse with ACT, and with his own company Graft Productions. Directing currently with The Royal Shakespeare Company on Dream 16.



Harold Pinter. CH, CBE.

One of the most influential modern British dramatists, his writing career spanned more than 50 years. Born 10th October 1930 in Hackney, London, as well as being a playwright, he was an actor, poet and theatre director. In 2005, he was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature.

His best known plays are *The Birthday Party (1958), The Dumb Waiter (1959), The Caretaker(1960),* and *Betrayal(1978)*. His first play was written as a student production for Bristol University, *The Room (1957),* which was followed by *The Birthday Party,* at the Lyric Hammersmith, which closed after only eight performances, but was enthusiastically reviewed by the critic Harold Hobson, too late to save the production from being a commercial disaster.

The Birthday Party was revived in 1964, after the success of The Caretaker, and this time was well received and critically acclaimed. There was an understanding by this time of a 'comedy of menace', and a readiness to accept a play that begins innocently and becomes threatening and absurdist.

From such humble beginnings, Pinter became a giant of literature throughout the world, and was often involved in human rights issues. After divorce from his first wife, Vivian Merchant, he married Lady Antonia Fraser, and they stayed together until his death on 24th December 2008.



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
