

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The grave stones shown in the cover photographs still exist today. The real Rebecca Nurse, wife of Francis, was accused of being a witch and hanged on 19th July 1692; the real John Proctor, farmer and husband of Elizabeth, was also condemned for witchcraft and hanged 19th August 1692; the real Giles Corey was pressed to death 19th September 1692. In Arthur Miller's story Rebecca and Proctor were hung together on the same morning and Giles Corey was pressed to death some time before but for the same reason Elizabeth describes in Miller's play i.e. he refused to answer his indictment "...aye or nay and so died Christian under the law."

From the search for witches in Salem, Massachusetts in 1692 to the search for communists in the Department of State launched in 1950 by Senator Joe McCarthy: Arthur Miller's play 'The Crucible', published in 1953, tells the story of the former but was inspired by the latter.

The graves of those accused of witchcraft in the theocratic society of 17th Century Salem are still to be seen and Miller uses many of their names in his play (see examples above). The critical themes of Intolerance, Hysteria and Reputation mould the storyline in this society where, if anything does not belong to God, it belongs to the Devil and dissent is not merely unlawful, it is associated with satanic activity. While hints of witchcraft abound, the protagonist John Proctor desires to preserve his reputation rather than testify against Abigail with whom he has committed adultery. In his trial he cries, "I have given you my soul; leave me my name!" At the end of the play however, Proctor redeems himself and makes a heroic choice to go to the gallows to die with integrity rather than sign a false confession to witchcraft.

FURTHER FACTS FROM THE DIRECTOR

It is interesting to note that soon after the fever died down Parris was voted from office, walked out in the highroad and was never heard of again. Legend has it that Abigail turned up later as a prostitute in Boston and Elizabeth Proctor married again four years after Proctor's death. Many farms owned by victims were left to ruin and for more than a century no one would buy them or live on them.

The jury prayed for forgiveness from all who had suffered and twenty years after the last execution surviving victims and relations of the dead were offered government compensation.

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
