Richard Brinsley Butler Sheridan was born in Dublin in 1751, His father was a famous Irish actor-manager, his mother a playwright and popular novelist. He was educated at Harrow but in 1770 moved with his family to Bath, where he began to write short plays and verses and met a beautiful young singer, Elizabeth Linley. Two years later Miss Linley, seeking to escape the attentions of her violent suitor, Major Matthews, appealed to Sheridan to escort her to France; the flight became an elopement and ended in their betrothal, although Sheridan had to fight two duels with Matthews before they finally married in 1773.

The Rivals was Sheridan's first attempt to earn an income large enough to support himself and his wife, whom he would not allow to sing in public as she wished. The play first appeared at Covent Garden in January 1775 and, after some initial difficulties, achieved great success. He followed it the same year with a farce, St. Patrick's Day, and a highly popular comic opera, The Duenna. In 1776 he succeeded Garrick as manager (and later part-owner) of Drury Lane, where he repeated The Rivals and produced A Trip to Scarborough, an unsuccessful adaptation of Vanbrugh's The Relapse. His masterpiece, The School for Scandal, appeared in 1777 and his brilliant farce The Critic two years later.

From then on Sheridan effectively abandoned his career as a dramatist for that of a politician and quickly won renown as a witty and eloquent orator. His only other play, a tragedy called *Pizarro* in 1799, was a failure but although his later years were marred by financial troubles he rarely lost his spirited and cheerful manner and remained until his death in 1816 a jovial companion, charming and amusing in conversation, whose private fits of depression were unguessed at by most of his friends.

The Rivals remains our most amusing comment upon the social life of eighteenth century England. Sheridan drew his material from many sources — Captain Absolute's "stooping" to a humbler station may have been inspired by Goldsmith, the planned elopement and the duel probably owed something to his own experiences, Mrs. Malaprop certainly originated in an unfinished play by his mother — but above all he set out to make fun of the foibles and peculiarities of fashionable society, imbuing his charming caricatures with a generous share of his own wit and vitality.


