RICHARD BRINSLEY SHERIDAN was born in 1751 at Dublin, where his father was manager of the Theatre Royal. His mother was a successful novelist and playwright. The family moved to England and Richard attended Harrow School from 1762 to 1768. In 1770 he went to Bath and there he met Elizabeth Linley, aged 16 and famous for her beauty and singing. Two years later when she fled abroad from the persistent attentions of a married admirer, Major Matthews, Sheridan went as her escort. Arriving at Dunkirk, he refused to leave her in a convent as she intended unless she married him first. She consented and they were wed. Mr. Linley arrived in pursuit of his daughter and returned with her to Bath. Shortly afterwards Sheridan, having fought two duels with Major Matthews, was reconciled to her father, married her a second time and took her to live with him in London.

His first play to be produced in London was "The Rivals", presented at the Theatre Royal, Covent Garden in 1775. In 1776 he bought David Garrick's share in the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane and became its manager until 1809. "The School for Scandal" was produced there in 1777 and "The Critic" in 1779. In 1780 he entered Parliament as Member for Stafford; became Under Secretary of State in 1782 and a Privy Councillor and Treasurer of the Navy in 1779. He remained in Parliament until 1812 and died in London in 1816.

Sheridan has been described as wittier though less naturally humorous than his contemporary, Oliver Goldsmith. The Comedy of Manners, which had a heyday of extreme brilliance and licentiousness with the Restoration dramatists, gave way in the early 18th Century, under the chastisement of Jeremy Collier who published "A Short View of the Immorality and Profaneness of the English Stage" in 1698, to the Sentimental Comedy. With the production of Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer" at Covent Garden in 1773, the Comedy of Manners was re-established, shorn of its previous indecency. J. B. Priestley says that Sheridan's plays "have kept their liveliness, wit and charm" and that "The School for Scandal might be described as a Restoration Comedy following Wycherley and Congreve without the impudent indecencies and so entirely suitable for family entertainment".
