




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AREA DISTRIBUTORS

We welcome especially to our 1965 Shakespeare production the school parties who at present are studying THE TEMPEST. The Centre presents one of the G.C.E. plays each year at this theatre—next season it will be TWELFTH NIGHT—and there are many other plays which have special interest for school parties. Any teachers who are not already on our regular mailing list are invited to leave their names and addresses at the Box Office if they would like to receive details of all the presentations at the Civic.

THE TEMPEST is produced by Margaret Rhodes. Her last production was THE LADY'S NOT FOR BURNING in 1963. Leonard Sheldon (Prospero) was recently seen in our production of AN IDEAL HUSBAND, whilst Julia Tonge (Miranda) plays her first part for the Centre. Gwen Hart and Michael Flint (Ariel and Caliban) will both be known to our regular patrons.

Our next production will be THE DEVILS by John Whiting, to be produced by Sydney Irving who, last season, was responsible for LIVE LIKE PIGS. This will be presented from Monday, 31st May to Saturday, 5th June at 7.30 p.m. The play comes from The Royal Shakespeare Company's repertoire and ours may be the first amateur production.

THE DEVILS, based on Aldous Huxley's THE DEVILS OF LOUDUN, tells of a true incident in seventeenth-century France. In 1623 Father Urbain Grandier was appointed Priest of St. Peter's Church, Loudun. In 1634, he was burned at the stake for diabolism. The play relates the events between these two dates.

From his early days at Loudun, Grandier attracted enemies. He found mistresses among his parishioners and went through a form of marriage (secretly) with one of them. He mocked the local intellectuals and professional men, he made political enemies, enemies in the Church and, eventually, by refusing to become involved with them, enemies among the nuns of a local Ursuline Convent.

Shortly after his refusal to act as Confessor and Advisor to the Convent, the nuns began to display signs of possession by devils. Under private, then later public, exorcism the Mother Superior (Soeur Jeanne des Anges) named Grandier as their possessor. Within one day Grandier was tried, found guilty, sentenced, tortured and executed. The play ends on the evening of that day.

This is the plot of THE DEVILS. However, the play tells us much more than that. It tells us a good deal about seventeenth century life. It tells us a good deal about the political and religious forces of the time. But most of all it tells us how Urbain Grandier searched for God without success, first through the Church, then through lust, then through love and finally found Him through pain and suffering.

The Centre was founded in 1945, and is established for the purpose of encouraging the appreciation and creation of the Arts by presentation and discussion. Groups may be formed to cover any branch of the Arts, and at present the following Groups are constituted:—

FINE ARTS

★ This Group meets every Monday for Life classes, painting and sketching, with talks and criticism of members' work. In the summer sketching outings are arranged.

DRAMA

★ Public productions of plays covering a wide range of choice are presented at the Civic Theatre, and weekly meetings on Fridays provide readings, and instruction in the various aspects of stage-craft. The Green Room presents private productions of a training and experimental nature.

LITERARY

For those with literary interests this group offers a varied programme of lectures, discussions, readings, etc., and scope for original work.

FILM

★ By the presentation of a programme of historical and recent films, appreciation of the technique of acting and directing is fostered, and discussions leading to the practical making of films are held. MUSIC

Meetings are held every Wednesday, to hear recitals of recorded music to suit a wide range of taste.
